Children in Reception	Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is important. Ask questions to find out more and to check they understand what has been said to them. Engage in storytimes. Listen to and talk about stories to build familiarity and understanding. Listen carefully to rhymes and songs, paying attention to how they sound. Learn rhymes, poems and songs. Engage in non-fiction books. Listen to and talk about selected non-fiction to develop a deep familiarity with new knowledge and vocabulary.	Learn new vocabulary. Use new vocabulary through the day. Articulate their ideas and thoughts in well- formed sentences. Connect one idea or action to another using a range of connectives. Describe events in some detail. Use talk to help work out problems and organise thinking and activities, and to explain how things work and why they might happen.
